



32 DPA SERIES: THE NAZI HOLOCAUST - SERIES II — The barracks in which prisoners lived were called blocks. They were always overcrowded. (In Birkenau, 200 prisoners slept in a room built for 40-50.) A former prisoner described a typical barrack: "The block was filled to capacity by four rows of low berths, looking like a three-tier chicken house. It was always damp and cold inside . . . and the aisles between the berths were covered with slimy mire. The straw in the berths . . . was rotten and stinking . . . and looked like dung. Indescribable dust everywhere. We used our shoes and caps as pillows. The stink, thirst and hunger made sleep impossible." The gaunt, starved prisoners in the Mauthausen concentration camp (above) were typical of the prisoners liberated by Allied Forces from the camps.
