NAZIS CLAMP NEW BAN ON JEWS; U. S. CALLS BERLIN ENVOY HOME

HULL SEEKS REPORT ON PERSECUTION

Announces Berlin Ambassador Summoned for Conference; Protest Demands Pour In WILSON PROMISES SPEECH

By Stanley Carroll. WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Secretary of State Cordell Hull tonight summoned U. S. Ambassador Hugh R. Wilson back to Washington from his Berlin post for conferences with President Roosevelt and Hull regarding Nazi persecution of Jews and Catholics in Germany.

Hull announced that the American envoy had been called home for a "report and conference." The Secretary's announcement came after a day in which the White House and State Department were deluged with demands for an immediate official condemnation of Reichsfuehrer Hitler's measures against racial and religious minorities throughout greater Germany.

KENNEDY MAY RETURN Reports that United States Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy is planning the immediate return to Washington for similar conferences regarding the grave situation abroad, also were current here. State Department officials said they were uninformed of such a move by the envoy to the Court of St. James.

Neither Hull nor his associates would vouchsafe any information beyond the dramatic announcement that Wilson had been ordered back. In other high Administration circles, however, it was learned that the atrocities against the Jews and Catholics, particularly the Jewish persecutions of the last few days, are directly responsible for the Wilson summons.

Berlin SCHOOL EDICT

All Jewish Pupils Ordered Expelled; New Drive Against Aryans Who Oppose Pogrom

PURGE SOUGHT

BERLIN, Nov. 14.—(Copyright, 1938, by International News Service.)—All German schools were ordered tonight to dismiss Jewish pupils in the latest of a series of anti-Semitic measures that produced international repercussions in Germany's relations with the United States and Great Britain.

The new edict came directly on the heels of a ruling by the Nazi education ministry closing the doors of universities and colleges to Jews. Elementary and high schools for Germans must immediately expel all Jewish students attending these institutions, it was ordered. Hereafter Jewish children will be permitted to attend only Jewish schools—a further move toward confining the Reich's Jews to an economic, social and cultural ghetto.

U. S. Ambassador Called Home

As restrictions against Jews multiplied, and even spread to countries neighboring the Reich, United States Ambassador Hugh R. Wilson, called to Washington by Secretary of State Hull, prepared to go to London Sunday en route home.

A sudden Nazi drive against "Aryans" who showed opposition to the anti-Semitic campaign was begun today. The drive was initiated by the Schwarze Korps, news paper of black-uniformed Nazi storm troops, which termed the "Aryan" sympathizers with Jews "intellectual beasts" and demanded that they be "purged," saying:

"One must place a well-shaped fist under their noses just as under the noses of their mentally related Jewish masters. They must be told: The hour has come when we shall muzzle you. We know that behind your mask (Continued on Page 9, Cols. 1-5)

JEWISH SITUATION AT A GLANCE

World diplomacy turned its attention to the Jewish situation in Germany. Developments yesterday were:

BERLIN—The government completed a plan whereby the Jewish community will pay a fine of 400 million dollars for the murder of Ernst von Rath.

Wealthy Jews paid "voluntary requisitions to finance repair to Jewish property.

Jews were banned from all elementary and high schools and university lectures. They were barred temporarily from the Stock Exchange. Their shops will be "Aryanized."

The British government protested linking the names of British statesmen to Von Rath's death, and reserved the right to claim damages for destruction of British-owned property.

The American embassy prepared a demarche about damage to American property.

More than 300 German Aryans who protested against the decrees on Jews were jailed.

LONDON—Prime Minister Chamberlain said British rights were being safeguarded. He said Britain had no undertaking to return colonies to Germany.

C. I. O. ACTS ON ROOSEVELT'S PEACE PLEA

'Factual Report' of Negotiations With A. F. L. Drafted in 4-Hour Committee Session

RECOMMENDATIONS DUE

First Constitutional Convention Originally Ordered to Form Organization Opposing Green

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 15 (Tuesday).—(AP)—The Committee for Industrial Organization, acting speedily on President Roosevelt's renewed plea for peace and unity within labor's ranks, completed a draft early this morning of what a spokesman described as a "factual report" of peace negotiations between the C. I. O. and A. F. of L.

Asked if there would be any observations in the report, the spokesman said some of the secret might be "construed as such." He added that there had been no controversy during the four-hour session of the peace committee, headed by Philip Murray, Steel Workers' Organizing Committee chairman.

The peace committee met last November and December with an A. F. of L. committee seeking to reach an agreement.

Seeking an end to the three-year warfare between the C. I. O. and American Federation of Labor, Mr. Roosevelt in a letter called upon the first C. I. O. constitutional convention to leave open "every possible door to access to peace and progress in the affairs of organized labor in the United States."

COURSE TO BE MAPPED

C. I. O. Chairman John L. Lewis said the letter would give "earnest and profound consideration." One high official of the C. I. O. who refused to be quoted, said the peace committee would draft a report for the convention and recommend some definite future course.

The Chief Executive's message was his second in recent weeks and substantially the same as that sent to the A. F. L. convention in Houston, where it was received without demonstration.

Fire Chief Ed Welch said a gasoline explosion in the residence of William McGlone sprayed the man with blazing fluid and spread fire through the house. Mrs. McGlone left her bed, wrapped blankets about her 30-year-old husband, smashed a front room window and hurried the man and four children to safety.

She then returned to her bed, picked up her three-day old son and climbed out the window.

Indian Summer Ends in East

Snow fell in half a dozen states yesterday closing out the Indian Summer season and putting heavy overcoats in the "must member" class.

Stiff west winds started it all. They whipped up snow flurries in Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, upper New York, North and South Dakota; pushed the temperature down over the North Atlantic seaboard and introduced winter weather in Chicago. Dey's Lake, N. D., Bemidji, Minn., and scores of other Midwestern places.

In the East, the sun was kind to suburban gardeners. But the first coating of ice appeared at Niagara Falls; two to four inches of snow dropped on Bethel, Me., and at Dartmouth College, Hanover, N. H.; the football boys put on mittens in practice. They'll be in California next week for a game.

In New York City, the mercury dropped to 43. Albany, N. Y., recorded the season's first snowfall in Manchester, N. H., the temperature dropped to 28 at midnight. Out of Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., five lake freighters pushed into high winds whipping Lake Superior.

Job Graft Quiz Figure Fails to Appear in Court

HUNT ON

Piling one sensation upon another, a revelation that Peter Del Gado, suspended police lieutenant, who failed to appear in court for arraignment on a grand jury indictment yesterday, has never been a United States citizen, came to light last night.

"We have learned definitely that Del Gado has never taken out naturalization papers, and therefore was not eligible to hold a position on the Los Angeles police department," deputy sheriffs seeking him revealed.

Meanwhile, a widely-circulated report that Del Gado may have been murdered because "he knew too much" spurred Sheriff Biscailuz to assign case investigators on the search for the missing officer.

WARRANT ISSUED

Del Gado is being sought on a bench warrant signed by Superior Judge Clarence L. Kincaid after he failed to appear for arraignment on the perjury indictment, growing out of the municipal civil service "job-buying" scandal.

After he failed to show up at the hearing, Judge Kincaid ordered his \$15,000 bail bond forfeited and fixed bail at \$25,000 on the bench warrant.

Armed with this warrant, Deputy Sheriffs John H. Morrell and Garner Brown went to Del Gado's palatial home at 3307 Landau street.

There they conferred with the suspended officer's sister, Mrs. Ysidra Medina; his aunt, Mrs. Maria Portillo; and a cousin, Mrs. Pola Amarillas, who disclosed that Del Gado was born at Chihuahua, Mexico.
